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FATHER SEELOS' VOCATION

In the fall of 1842 Father Seelos entered St. Jerome's the Augsburg diocesan seminary at Gillingen. He had been in a quandary what to do while waiting to hear from the Redemptorist superior in America. His stay at St. Jerome's lasted only five weeks. Even then he made an impression.

The Regent of the seminary gave him a farewell testimonial: "His life in the seminary was such that it gives great promise that he who leaves it with the grade Excellent in application, in achievement, and in moral conduct will become a great pastor of souls."

A note in the daily paper said, ''at eight o'clock this morning one of the most worthy young men at the clerical seminary, Francis Xavier Seelos, left to enter the Redemptorist Order in Baltimore and devote himself to the life of a missionary there.'' The note went on to hope that many would follow Seelos' rare example of generosity and apostolic zeal.

And so in 1971 this, too, is our prayer.

VIRTUE FOR JUNE: PURITY PATRON: ST. JAMES MINOR, APOSTLE

Father Seelos lived the Bible text of this month of Purity: Blessed are the clean of heart for they shall see God. (Mark 5/8) His heart was pure, hence his thoughts, words and actions were pure. We saw him last month as a man who was detached from the material things of life. He could well preach: If the love of riches estrange the soul from God, still more do the pleasures of the flesh weigh down the heart and prevent it from consecrating itself to the love of God. He used to say there was a dearth of vocations to the priesthood and the religious life because of voluntary celibacy demanded by the church of her priests and religious. He used to say of himself: Since God has raised me to the most sublime dignity of the priesthood, He expects of me the highest sanctity and the most absolute purity. I will strive after perfection. His Redemptorist Rule told him: Since this virtue is so pleasing to the Son of God and so necessary to the evangelical laborer, the subjects of this congregation shall guard it most carefully.

His Rule told him to be modest, gentle, pleasant, polite, approachable, as Christ was, but always to lead souls to God. For a priest, all contact with souls is to bring them to Christ.

Father Seelos realized that to be pure, he had to deny himself many things, mortify himself much. He knew he had to be generous with God. He tried never to shock, surprise, scandalize anyone by his words and actions, where he went, how he dressed, how he spoke.

He knew his perseverance in his vocation of celibacy depended on prayer. He was up early in the morning for the community meditation of one-half hour. He was in the chapel with the Blessed Sacrament before dinner for the particular examination of conscience. He dedicated the first three hours of the afternoon to the Passion of our Lord, whether he was in his room, in the parlors, on the street, or visiting hospitals. The immediate half hour before supper he spent in the chapel meditating on the sufferings and death of Christ. The prayer of St. Alphonsus was his: Grant that I may love Thee always, and then do with me as Thou wilt.

He put his purity in the keeping of the Blessed Mother of God. The big fifteen decade rosary at his side kept him in constant touch with Mary. He recited her litany daily.

Because he lived this kind of a life he became a saint.

The church is suffering today because the spirit of Jesus and the sanctity of old is lacking. Sex is the big word.

If anybody wishes to be pure, he must pray, he must deny himself many things, he must love Holy Mass and daily Holy Communion and the Blessed Mother of God.
