FATHER SEELOS LIVED A POOR LIFE

The Virtue for May: Poverty Patron: St. Thomas the Apostle

Text: Blessed are the poor in Spirit. (Matt. 5/3)

Father Seelos used to say nobody ever wanted to be absolutely poor, except Our Lord, Jesus Christ. He chose poverty as an outstanding virtue of His life - born in a stable, died on a cross, and during His life He had not where to lay His head. He had no home. He had one garment. Nobody is asked by Him to live that kind of a life, yet everybody must practice the virtue of Poverty. That means, not to be attached to the material, transitory money-things of the world. Money-things means anything that has a money value. To practice the virtue of Poverty does not mean that you cannot have money, millions of dollars. Canonized kings and queens of history had plenty of it. If money, or the material things of the world keep you from Holy Mass on Sunday and the Sacraments, and you just live for the world, you are failing against the virtue of Poverty. Apparently, few rich people have any kind of religion. Why? So many young people are pleasure-mad. Why are they not lovers of Jesus Christ and spend some time in prayer? In your life, who is first, God or Mammon? Christ taught: You cannot serve two masters. He says we must seek first the Kingdom of Heaven.

The vow of Poverty is something different. People in the religious life make this vow. They give up the possession of all things of money-value. They live by permission. They are like children in a family. They depend upon the Order to support them, to give them a bed and a dining table and some modest, never expensive or abundant, clothes. Father Seelos was a holy religious. He owned nothing. He took what was given to him, he was always satisfied. He never complained, he never wasted. His Redemptorist vow was strict. He slept on a straw mattress. Could you? The Infant Jesus did. Father Seelos was poor because Christ was poor. He made the vow of Poverty to be able to practice the Virtue of Poverty perfectly.

Thank God for what you have. Never complain, never waste. Deny yourself something to give something to the poor, especially in your Church Welfare Collections. Give a few nickels every week to the St. Vincent de Paul Society or drop them in the St. Anthony Poor Box. Help support a seminary.

Nobody was poorer than our Lord's Blessed Mother. Ask her to help you to put God and His service first in your life. Father Seelos pray for us.
