FATHER SEELOS AND ST. MARY'S - DETROIT

The Redemptorists first arrived in Detroit, Michigan, shortly after they came to America in 1832. They came to this city in the persons of Father Francis Haetscher and Brother Aloysius Schuh. It was only in 1846 after an absence of nearly ten years that the Redemptorists returned to Detroit and founded the parish of St. Mary's. Here they remained until 1872. In 1880 they would come back again to found the parish of Holy Redeemer on the corners of Junction and Vernor.

In late November of 1865 Father Seelos joined the community at St. Mary's. He had been relieved of his duties as head of the mission band, perhaps because of fear for his health. For most of the ten months he served in Detroit he was engaged in parish work. He did give some retreats to priests and religious during that time.

Because of a shift of personnel in the already undermanned American province, the provincial selected Father Seelos in September of 1866 to fill a void in the trilingual parish of New Orleans. St. Mary's, Detroit, was sad to lose him, and they gave him a rousing farewell. His superior was most impressed with the love and gratitude showered on him by the people. Bishop Lefevre of Detroit was quoted as saying, "I am sorry that Father Seelos must leave my diocese, for one has only to look at him to know that he is a saint."

HOLY PURITY

From the earliest days of the Church, Christians have bound themselves to a life of perfect chastity; when they did so, it was in imitation of the life led by our Blessed Lord. He thought of nothing else but the interest of His Father in heaven. This He explained clearly to His Mother and St. Joseph when they discovered Him in the temple with the doctors. He was then only twelve years of age, nevertheless, He expressed His detachment from all family ties in His reply: "Did you not know that I must be about My Father's business?" (Luke, 2. 49). His Father was His one interest, His first preoccupation. He was, then, perfectly detached from His family, His friends.

And for what purpose? To devote Himself to the things of the Lord; to be solicitous for the things that belong to His Father, how He might please Him. His nights were passed in speaking to Him in heart to heart prayer; His days were spent in preaching His word, and in kindling in the hearts of others love and devotion to His heavenly Father. What better example of this than our Divine Savior Himself?

Whilst He lived on earth, our Lord, like every human being, had friends and special friends. Some were more closely associated with Him than others. John the Baptist was one of these, another John was to be the disciple whom Jesus loved. And since a man's closest and most intimate friend is his mother, Mary was most intimate with Jesus.

The Son of God was the only one in a position to select His Mother and for this He chose a virgin, "the Virgin most pure." A virgin she was and a virgin she was to remain always.

Then to take the place of an earthly father, another father had to be found, one who would earn daily bread for Him and His Mother, one who would teach Him a trade and initiate Him into business methods and show Him how to support His Mother later on. The man chosen for all this is referred to by the Church as "the most chaste spouse of Mary, the guardian of virgins"—St. Joseph.

Nothing could prove more clearly our Divine Lord's special love for this virtue than those persons He chose to associate with so intimately while living here on earth.

O Jesus, lover of chaste souls, keep me ever close to Yourself, so that I may always be faithful.
