FATHER SEELOS MEMORIAL MASS OCTOBER 2



The annual memorial Mass for Father Seelos will be celebrated in St. Mary's Assumption Church at 11:30 A. M. on Sunday, October 2. St. Mary's Church is located on the corner of Josephine and Constance Streets in the Irish Channel of New Orleans.

Very Reverend John Kelly, C.S.S.R., pastor of St. Boniface's Church in Philadelphia, will be the main concelebrant and homilist at the Mass. Born in Pittsburgh, Father Kelly was a long-time missionary in Puerto Rico, and just recently was the pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church in the Bronx, New York.

Father Seelos died on October 4, 1867, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. His statue watches over the garden of St. Mary's, looking towards the area where Father Seelos breathed his last.

MORTIFICATION: THE CURE FOR EXCESSIVE SELF-LOVE

At first blush it might seem that the very idea of self-love is likely to be frowned upon by spiritual writers, until we realize that Jesus commanded us to love our neighbors as ourselves. The love that we have for ourselves is the measure of the love we should have for others.

Because we are the creatures of God's loving hand, it stands to reason that we should have a deep respect for ourselves. Each one of us has a natural dignity: God loves us, we are worthy of His creation, His redemption. No human being can diminish our standing before God.

However, there is such a vice called excessive self-love. We witness self-love in the pampered child, the spoiled brat. Heaven help us when this child grows up.

To keep self-love from deteriorating, we have the virtue of mortification. A French spiritual writer has described this virtue: "Mortification consists not in the death of our evil inclinations or in the peace which follows it, but in the energetic and valiant struggle waged against these inclinations in order to extirpate them."

In a more simple fashion we can say that the purpose of mortification is to train ourselves to say no to lawful pleasures, so that when we are tempted to do something unlawful, we may have the strength to decline the invitation to sin.

Our five senses, sight, hearing, taste, smell, feeling are blind faculties. They reach out to their proper object without making any moral judgments. Besides, our imagination can dream up just about anything. There is no censor in its equipment. Much the same situation prevails with our memory. The memory can evoke anything from the past, good, bad or indifferent.

These senses and faculties of ours need, then, a curb, a rein, to keep us in line with our principles of morality. We do not, after all, have to hear all the news, we do not have to see all the programs on TV, we do not have to eat everything in sight all at one time. We can put a halt to useless day-dreaming, we can keep from dwelling excessively in the past.

Last year my sister had a tumor on her left kidney, so the doctors thought. The tumor encased the kidney, spleen and adrenal gland. The cancer was in the adrenal gland, a very rare type of cancer. Only about 150 people a year have this kind of cancer in the United States.

My sister started on chemotherapy in September of last year and finished in May of this year. During those eight months she was very sick and had to have blood at least four times.

I think for a long time she had lost her faith in God, but we kept on talking to her and praying for her. Last week she had three more units of blood and a catscan to see if she needed more treatments. The test came back negative, no sign of cancer at all, no tumors!
