## ANNUAL MEMORIAL MASS — OCTOBER 1



The annual memorial Mass for the Servant of God, Father Francis Xavier Seelos, will be celebrated in St. Mary's Assumption Church on Sunday, October 1, at 11:30 A.M. Very Reverend Matthew J. Kerschen, C.SS.R., will be the principal concelebrant and homilist at the Mass honoring the death of Father Seelos on October 4, 1867.

Father Kerschen, a native of Wichita, Kansas, for the past eight years has been the superior of the Redemptorists of the vice-province of New Orleans which embraces the states of the central south portion of our country.

The combined choirs of St. Alphonsus and St. Joseph parishes will sing under the direction of Mr. Lloyd Celentano. Blessings with the mission crucifix of Father Seelos will be given after the ceremonies are over. A reception will be held in the garden of St. Mary's immediately after the Mass. Off-street parking will be available in the St. Alphonsus schoolyard.

St. Mary's Assumption Church is in the Irish Channel on the corner of Josephine and Constance Streets.

## **"SLOW ME DOWN, LORD"**

The late beloved Cardinal of Boston, Richard Cushing, emphasized the need for us to slow down in the frenzied race called life: "Time Out" — "Stop" — "Slow Down and Live" — "Tune In" — "Let's Listen" — "Be Quiet" — "Turn Off the Clatter of Rock and Roll" — "Pause and Be Silent" so that I may enjoy my daily living, keep my mind sane, protect it from the loud vibes of jazz and the throbbing beat of the "jungle" around me.

Should we not recognize the necessity of good health, of good sense, the smart way, when we understand that too much speed is dangerous? This is the reason we have speed limits, even though at times we wonder who observes them. Too rich a diet can fatten us, and overweight, we can be the target of many ills. Even in a game, is it not wise to call a time-out, and learn the ploys and changes in our game plan that will help us to win the contest?

Can we not pray to the God of wisdom and truth to teach us the art of daily rests; five minutes here, one minute there — the art of slowing down to look at a flower, to chat with a friend, to say hello to an enemy, to pat a dog on the head, or read a line or two from a good book (why not the Book of books?).

Every day we engage in conversation as a part of daily life. We communicate with those with whom we live, work, recreate. In these exchanges we have to learn not only to speak what is on our mind, but we must listen, so that others can give their views to us. Even our prayers should not be a torrent of words gushing out of our mouths, but we should pause for a moment here and there to listen to the whisperings of God's grace in our hearts.

The prophet Samuel gave us a prayer for just such moments, "Speak, Lord, for Your servant is listening" (I Sam. 3/9). Each day we can repeat a similar prayer to the triune God. "Speak and let me hear Your words of direction and decision." "Speak and give me strength to follow Your way." "Speak and let me tune in with a few refreshing pauses this day." "Speak, Lord, You are the Truth and the Life." At the end of life's journey let us hear You say, "Well done, good and faithful servant; enter the joy of Your Lord." (Matt. 25/21).

Would that the fable of the hare and the tortoise remind us that the race of life is not always to the swift — that there is another way of leading our life: "Slow me down, Lord."
