## ANNUAL MEMORIAL MASS - OCTOBER 4

The annual memorial Mass for Father Francis Xavier Seelos, C.S.S.R., will be celebrated on Sunday, October 4 in St. Mary's Assumption Church at 11:30 A.M. St. Mary's Church is on the corner of Josephine and Constance Streets in the Irish Channel of New Orleans. Father Joseph Steffes, C.S.S.R., pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Crowley, Louisiana, will be the principal concelebrant and homilist at the Mass.

Father Seelos is a candidate for sainthood. His cause is being pursued in Rome. He was born in Bavaria and came to America to join the Redemptorists in 1843. He was ordained the next year and in 1866 came to New Orleans to minister to the German congregation of St. Mary's. On October 4 of the following year he died in a yellow fever epidemic. He is revered as a very holy man. His tomb in St. Mary's Church has been visited by people from all over the world. This year marks the 125th anniversary of his death.

## MORTIFICATION

The object of our lives on earth is to attain eternal happiness, to be united with God forever. To be on the way to this goal we must observe God's commandments: love God, love your neighbor. Jesus told us that if we love God, then God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit comes to dwell in us. "Anyone who loves Me will be true to My word, and My Father will love him; We will come to him and make our dwelling place with him" (John, 14/23). Thus St. Paul can say that we are the temple of God.

The grace of God, a sharing in His own divine life, remains in us as long as we are free of mortal sin. Only one thing can separate us from the love of God, and that is, mortal sin. To impress this reality on us, Jesus made use of analogy of the vine and the branches. He is the vine, we are the branches. As long as the branch is attached to the vine, it can produce good fruit; cut off from the vine, the branch can only wither and die. It cannot produce fruit of any kind. "Apart from Me, you can do nothing," says the Master. Sin separates us from God. Jesus goes on to say, "A man who does not live in Me is like a withered, rejected branch, picked up to be thrown in the fire and burnt" (John, 15/1-6).

It follows, then, that union with God is the most important business of our life. No worldly success or pleasure or amount of money can satisfy the longing of the human heart to be one with God. To help maintain this union, we need the virtue of mortification. Mortification is a little bit of dying to one's self.

Mortification is eating a little less at mealtime, not eating a dessert, putting up with heat or bearing the cold, not listening to idle gossip, refraining from making a sharp retort, being extra kind towards one who is not easy to get along with, letting someone else go ahead of you, helping someone to carry groceries, taking someone to church, and so on.

Mortification will involve a little pain. The vine grower prunes the vine and the branches. He keeps the earth beneath clean of any untoward growth, cuts off the dead branches, he throws the withered leaves into the fire. A little pain seems so trifling in the light of eternity.

Jesus makes this point when He told us, "I solemnly assure you, unless the grain of wheat falls to the earth and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat. But if it dies, it produces much fruit. The man who loves his life loses it, while the man who hates his life in this world preserves it to life eternal" (John, 12/14-25).
