# ST. GERARD'S, BATON ROUGE

For the past dozen years or so, a special memorial Mass for Father Seelos was celebrated in the area of Baton Rouge, first in St. Alphonsus Church in Greenwell Springs for several years and lately in the church of St. Gerard in the city itself. Father Seelos, in the short year he spent in Louisiana, preached a retreat to the priests of Natchez diocese. On his way there he may have stopped in Baton Rouge. Mr. O. J. Templet has spearheaded the efforts to make Father Seelos known in the capital of Louisiana, aided by the Knights of Columbus and the Catholic Daughters of the Americas.

# CHRIST, OUR HOPE OF GLORY

If you ever look at the travel section of your Sunday newspaper or leaf through the travel magazines in the waiting room of your doctor or dentist, you may have noticed the appeal is often made by travel bureaus or agents to come visit their particular "Paradise." They tease the reader with the promises of bright sun, deep blue skies, sparkling white sand, swaying palm trees, balmy breezes. Tantalizing, isn't it, especially if it is winter time and you live in a cold climate. We all know that despite the promises, the reality leaves something to be desired: crawly creatures and biting insects, sand in the food, torrential and violent storms. Perhaps it is the best our imperfect world can offer.

The garden of Eden where Adam and Eve entered into this world was known as paradise. But they lost it. God promised the coming of one who would win it back for them and us. In the fullness of time Jesus became our Brother through the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Redeemer through His death on the cross and His resurrection three days later, and thus our hope of glory.

St. Paul wrote to the Colossians: "God has willed to make known to them (His holy ones) the glory beyond price which this mystery brings to the Gentiles — the mystery of Christ in you, your hope of glory. This is the Christ we proclaim . . ." (Col. 1: 27).

Heaven is paradise, heaven is eternal life with God. Jesus transmitted that promise to us when He spoke of the Holy Eucharist in the sixth chapter of the Gospel according to St. John: "I myself am the living bread come down from heaven. If anyone eats this bread he shall live forever; the bread I will give is My flesh, for the life of the

world." When some of His hearers questioned the possibility of this, He said even more emphatically: "Let Me solemnly assure you, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you. He who feeds on My flesh and drinks My blood has life eternal, and I will raise him up on the last

day" (John 6: 53-54).

There is a very dramatic episode in the life of Christ, His bringing His friend, Lazarus, back to life. It was several days after Lazarus had died that Jesus appeared in Bethany, the home of Martha and Mary. Many people had come from Jerusalem to console Martha and Mary on the death of their brother. Martha had gone out to meet Jesus and said that if He had been there Lazarus would never have died. Jesus assured her: "Your brother will rise again." Martha replied, "I know he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." It was then Jesus uttered those words that have echoed down the halls of the centuries: "I am the resurrection and the life: whoever believes in Me, though he should die, will come to life; and whoever is alive and believes in Me shall never die" (John 11: 17-26).

The most dramatic incident in the life of Christ had to be His bloody and violent death on the cross. Surrounded by insensitive soldiers and a jeering mob, comforted only by a handful of faithful friends, His Mother Mary, Mary Magdalene, St. John and a few others, He was left to die with two thieves. The thief on His left taunted and cursed Him. The one on His right, however, acknowledged his sins and turning to Jesus, said, "Jesus, remember me when You come into Your reign." His answer was one we all wait to hear: "I assure you: this day you will be with Me in paradise"

(Luke 23: 42-43).
