REDEMPTORISTS IN THAILAND



Bishop Clarence J. Duhart, C.S.S.R.

In 1948 a group of American Redemptorists, with Father Clarence Duhart, C.S.S.R., as superior, set sail for Thailand. In 48 years there are foundations in Bangkok, Khonkaen, Nongkhai, Sriracha, Pattaya, Udonthani. Over 40 Redemptorists, mostly Thais, staff the mission. Father Duhart was named the first bishop of the diocese of Udonthani. When he retired, a Thai Redemptorist, Father George Phimphisan, C.S.S.R., was named in his place. Despite the limitations of age, Bishop Duhart carries on an active apostolate in Bangkok. He follows the cause of Father Seelos with great interest.

'OF ALL SAD WORDS'

In September of 1994 I suffered a mild heart attack. After a short hospital stay, I returned home to recuperate. I was intent on my exercise program, physical therapy, and determined to lose weight. Of course, I continued seeing my heart specialist on a regular basis and everything seemed to be progressing as it should. Then in December of 1995 during a routine visit to the doctor, as I was taking my treadmill stress test, my pulse suddenly elevated from about 125 beats per minute to over 175 beats per minute, which, of course, caused the doctor some major concern. After checking my heart with the ultra sound machine, he decided it was necessary for me to enter the hospital again for another angiogram test, which I had undergone shortly after my heart attack the previous year. In that test the doctor had found that one of the valves in my heart was completely blocked and two others were partially blocked. With this knowledge and what he was seeing from my tests in December, he informed me of the probability of either an angioplasty or even a triple bypass surgery. It was a frightening thing even to think about indeed. On returning home and waiting the five days for my scheduled angiogram at Kootenai Medical Center in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, I and my entire family did a lot of praying and begging God for the graces I would surely need in the days ahead.

Some years ago some dear friends of ours who live in St. Bernard, Louisiana, had sent us a holy card of Father Francis Xavier Seelos with a cloth memento of the servant of God. I must confess that I had put it in a desk drawer and never thought about it again. As I was looking in my desk the day that I returned from my doctor's appointment, there was the above-mentioned holy card. Needless to say, I felt that God intended me to find it and use it now. I began immediately saying the prayer on the holy card and touching the memento to my heart. I knew that Father Seelos would hear me and intercede for me before the throne of God.

On the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, December 12th, 1995, I entered the medical center for my scheduled angiogram. My dear husband and two of my older sons were by my side until I was taken away for the procedure. After the test was finished, it was about three hours before the doctor and assistants completed their diagnosis of my angiogram and the doctor came into my room with the results. He was smiling and seemed happy as he informed that what he could see from the test that nothing looked worse than the test he had given me in September of 1994 —, in fact, one valve looked somewhat improved. The doctor informed me that there was nothing he felt had to be done to my heart at this time. I am convinced that Father Seelos' prayers before the throne of God were powerful. I am grateful and pray that he will soon be declared a saint of the Church.

My son had difficulty in selling his house. I turned to Father Seelos to help find a buyer for his house. After three days someone made an offer on the house and they are in the process of signing the final papers in a few days. Praise God and thanks again to Father Seelos for his prayers.

P.S. We have been members of St. Thomas parish in Coeur d'Alene, for about seven years. Our parish is serviced by the Redemptorists. This makes Father Seelos more special to all of us.
