OUR LADY OF FATIMA

The Blessed Mother appeared to the three children of Fatima, Lucy, Jacinta, and Francisco 80 years ago. Since then millions of pilgrims have come to this peaceful spot 100 miles north of Portugal's capital, Lisbon. A year ago this month I was one of those pilgrims. Although I was the only passenger to get off the train from Lisbon, the basilica was filled to overflowing for the Sunday evening Mass. Jacinta and Francisco died young and are buried

in the basilica. Lucy is a nun and is still living, the only remaining witness of the apparitions.
