Father Matthew Kerschen, C.SS.R., entered into eternal life at St. Clement's Health Care Center, Liguori, Missouri on February 27 of this year. On January 6 he completed fifty years of priesthood and was able to celebrate a jubilee Mass with his family in Wichita, Kansas. He had been pastor in Houston, and Corpus Christi, Texas, and also in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. For nine years he was the vice-provincial of the Redemptorists in the south. Always a friend and devotee of Father Seelos we commend his soul to your good prayers.

DOWN, DOWN...

Life is full of unexplainable happenings. For instance, in the midst of the computer revolution we no longer find it extraordinary that large corporations are 'downsizing.' It is not suprising to learn that in one week three or four companies are giving pink

slips to as many as 400,000 workers. What is surprising is to learn that the rate of unemployment continues to dip below five percent. The skeptic in me wonders who is keeping score.

It hasn't been too many years ago that we used to 'dress up' for special occasions for church, for Sundays, for traveling or conducting business, for an appearance on television. Today we dress down. Nowhere is this more evident that in traveling. As a frequent traveler in the pursuit of my vocation as a priest, I noticed three distinct modes of dress, one for airplane, one for train, one for bus. Today, that is no longer a matter of fact. With the new wrinkle-proof and washable materials available, just about any fashion goes.

Good people who work with me have suggested that I tell church-goers how to dress. I am not a fashion expert and I would not relish being told to mind my own business. I would like to think that adults should know what is decent for the worship of the Lord. Common sense tells us the church is not the playground nor

the beach nor the gymnasium.

There are other trends in modern life that are more indicative of the decay that is beginning to pervade the moral fiber of our lives. Innocently enough it is in education that we see a lowering of our customary standards. Instead of smartening up our children, we are dumbing them down. Instead of challenging them to do and be better, we are allowing them to find comfort in their weaknesses. Children are smarter than we think. They learn quickly how to play the game. Unfortunately, we are not competing with the rest of the world in this field. To our shame!

The lowering of the old standards in dress and education has, to our confusion, spread into the realm of morality. Sin is no longer sin. The difference between right and wrong has been dulled. Adultery is a private affair. Tell that to the two families involved and the children so often condemned to living in broken homes. "It's nobody's business." "Everybody does it and everybody lies about it," so we hear. Is it fair to

list all of us in the same free-wheeling group?

We are all sinners and we are all redeemed by the suffering, death and resurrection of our divine Savior. As Jesus did, the Church of Jesus offers mercy and forgiveness in the confessional. As often as we fall into sin, we can rise again and resolve to live up to the standards outlined by God in the Ten Commandments. It is true, Jesus forgave the woman taken in adultery. It is true He challenged the one without sin to cast the first stone. But He told the woman to go and sin no more. He insisted that adultery was still a sin.

The so-called wall of separation of church and state would seem to forbid any appeal to common decency or common values. How are we going to get back to the decency and morality that years ago was our face as a nation to the world, despite our multicultural, multi-racial, multi-religious environment? In the spiritual vacuum that exists in our society, we who believe in God and have expectations of good can insist and insist again that common standards are possible. There is no need to appeal always and everywhere to the baser instincts of our citizens and thus enshrine the least common denominator.
