“National Treasure” Receives Special Award

Most Reverend Joseph W. Tobin, C.Ss.R., Superior General of the Redemptorists, arrived from Rome to be the principal celebrant at the annual memorial Mass for Blessed Francis Seelos on Sunday, October 7, 2001 in St. Mary's Assumption Church, New Orleans. The Mass commemorated the 134th anniversary of Father Seelos' death on October 4, 1867. The Vatican has assigned his feast day on October 5, the day of his burial in St. Mary's Church.

Father Tobin is the Superior General of the 6,000 Redemptorist priests

and brothers around the world. He is originally from Detroit, Michigan. He is only the second American to serve as Superior General in the history of the Redemptorists, since their founding in 1732 by Saint Alphonsus Liguori.

Immediately following the Mass a reception was held in honor of Ambassador Corinne “Lindy” Claiborne Boggs. Mrs. Boggs, a former member of the U.S. House of Representatives, was appointed in 1997 as U.S. Ambassador to the Holy See. She served in this capacity for over three years. As a diplomat at the Vatican, she hosted re-



“I will not embarrass Lindy by recounting her rich and varied service to the city of New Orleans and the state of Louisiana as well as to our country and the world community. For the moment, I wish only to remind you of her term as an ambassador of the U.S.A. During her tenure in the diplomatic corps before the Holy See, Lindy was renowned for her graciousness and skillful diplomacy...Each one of us has been personally commissioned as an ambassador. On the day of our baptism, our head was anointed with chrism as an outward sign of our new identity... As St. Paul says, ‘We are ambassadors for Christ...’” (cf. 2Cor.5,20)

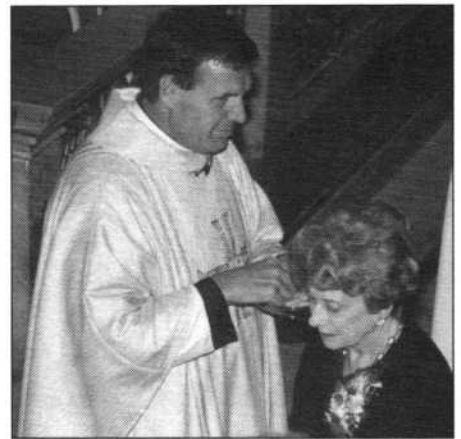

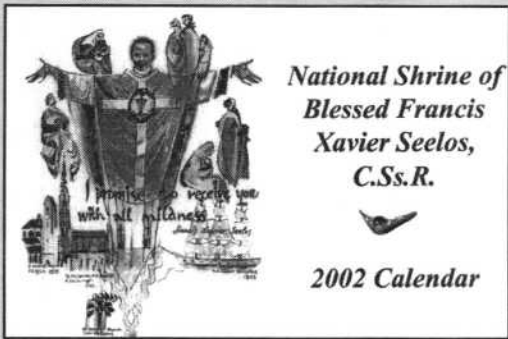

I want to report to you a wonderful recovery and healing of my grandson, who was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML), two days before Christmas in 2000, at the age of four-and-a-half. AML is quite rare in children and requires a different and very intense chemotherapy. He underwent this at Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh for nine months. We almost lost him at one time and so many times only the tubes were keeping him alive.

Then a friend gave me the fabric swatch and prayers for Blessed Francis Seelos. My son immediately pinned the fabric swatch to my grandson's hospital gown and I would say the prayers that were printed on the cards. He completed all the treatments and a bone marrow test showed he was in full remission. Then he was able to start kindergarten in September. When I look at him, I feel that he has had a miraculous recovery and I think Blessed Francis Seelos played a great part in it.

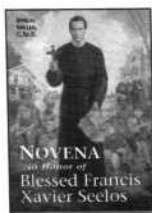
Does your Will include Blessed Francis Seelos?
