We give thanks for our comfort and prosperity as we share our blessings with others.


With thanks and praise, may the love of God enfold us, the peace of God dwell within us and the joy of God uplift us.

Seelos: Part 8 - Learning how to be a priest and guide a parish

This book, written by Fr. Richard Boever, C.Ss.R., is the story of Blessed Seelos' life told as though he were telling his own story. Look for additional installments in future issues of this newsletter.



When I was 32 years old, there was a change of administration at St. Philomena's. I was appointed pastor of the parish and rector of the community. One of my first concerns was to establish a place for our orphaned German children. We presented these children for adoption from the pulpit at Sunday Masses and worthy families often took them into their homes, but more was needed, especially for the littlest ones. We established our orphanage in 1851 and by the grace of God, the marvelous School Sisters of Notre Dame took charge of the orphanage. What a blessing!

Part of a pastor's job is raising the necessary funds to keep the parish going. We needed a new organ chamber, new gutters and some renovations on the interior of the church. All of this cost money! I found this entailed much effort and sweat, and the money didn't seem to flow unless one did a lot of complaining and constantly made a big noise. This wasn't in my nature and I didn't like doing it, but it was necessary.

I officially became a citizen of the United States during my time in Pittsburgh. In those days, an immigrant could apply for citizenship after he or she lived in the United States for five years, had no record of civil offense and renounced allegiance to the country from which he

or she emigrated. I met the qualifications and on October 6, 1852, I received my naturalization papers.


During my days in Pittsburgh, two members of my family died back in Bavaria. My sister Kunigunda, who was only 20 years old, fell from the hayloft and died almost instantly. Then, my father, Mang, died September 11, 1853. I didn't learn of these deaths for some time because of the slow mail delivery between Europe and the United States. Strangely, however, I dreamed of my father very near the day of his death. He was uncommonly handsome in my dream.

In Pittsburgh, there were plenty of opportunities to practice virtue and pray for people who were sick. I often found I could do with less in the face of those who had not enough. Once, I gave my boots to a poor man who had tattered shoes and another time I gave my mittens to a washer woman on a cold day. God often blessed the sick with recovery when I prayed with them. I praised God for his mercy but felt worried because people seemed to think that the cures came from my hands. I knew their healing was always a gift from God.

Pittsburgh will always hold a special place in my heart. Though I stayed at St. James in Baltimore for a bit of time after my ordination to the priesthood, I consider St. Philomena's as my first long-time assignment. I served there from 1845 until 1854.

During those years, I was Assistant Pastor, Novice Master, and eventually Pastor of the Parish and Rector of the Community. It was in Pittsburgh that I learned how to be a priest and how to be the superior of the community. I was young and filled with zeal. One time, I recall that Neumann chided me that we have to leave God, the Lord, something to do! I hold dear the men with whom I was stationed and the good souls of the parishioners. I would take the experiences of Pittsburgh into all my future assignments.

In August 2020, my grandparents fell ill with fever, cough and breathing difficulty. We feared it was coronavirus. Both being elderly and Grandma having diabetes and heart disease, we knew it was imperative to get them admitted to a hospital ASAP. However, due to circumstances in the Philippines, it was more than two weeks before they could be admitted. We began praying to Blessed Seelos, holding a first class relic daily. They were admitted to the hospital and placed in

the ICU unit. This is when we witnessed Blessed Seelos intercede powerfully on their behalf. My Grandma, who was in greater danger than my Grandpa, began recovering more quickly. In fact, she left the hospital sooner than Grandpa. Both are now home and recovered from both pneumonia and coronavirus a month later. NEW ROADS, LA

My son had prostate surgery for cancer. He went into surgery with a medal of Blessed Seelos taped to his hand. The surgery was so successful he did not have to have chemo. It has been 5 years since the operation and he is doing fine. He prays to Blessed Seelos every day and thanks God each day for his recovery.

RESERVE, LA

My wife was born with a dislocated hip. After each of our children were born, the pain got progressively worse. She started going to the Healing Masses at the Seelos Shrine and praying for the intercession of Father Seelos for healing so she would not have to have a hip replacement. A couple of months after she started this, she asked me one day if her back was sunburned because it felt like it was burning. I said no. Her cousin's wife, who worked in a doctor's office, told her it might be a pinched nerve and that she should get it checked. She went to the doctor and had an x-ray done. When we got home, there

was a message on the machine for her to call the doctor immediately. Her top vertebrae was broken in half long ways, and she needed to see a neurosurgeon right away. The neurosurgeon said it was a miracle that she was walking and that if she had not found out about the broken vertebrae, she would have soon started to have paralysis. Thank the Lord that she had surgery and has been fine for over a decade now. I think the intercession of Father Seelos powerfully helped her by healing what she really needed healed. Praise Jesus!!
