He even made a journey to Washington, D.C. to call upon President Lincoln at the White House to express his concern of the seminarians under his charge being drafted into the Army during the Civil War.

Understanding Sacramentals



Among the items in our gift shop, we have available a number of sacramentals. Catholic sacramentals include relics, crucifixes, rosaries, scapulars, religious medals, holy water, blessed oil, blessed salt, statutes, etc. Some of these items are brought to a priest to bless them after purchase; some items are blessed before purchase. For the items that are blessed already, including holy water, oil and salt, there is no charge for the sacramental, but there is a cost for the containers that hold them, and charges for mailing, if required.

Sacramentals are used in a great many circumstances of life. Always, the use of a sacramental must include a prayer for the need felt by the individual. The Catechism of the Catholic Church notes that "every baptized person is called to be a 'blessing,' and to bless". It is for this reason that many of our pilgrims take home with them holy water, blessed oils

and blessed salt, as well as other articles of devotion—they want to bless their own loved ones or themselves who are experiencing a special need in life.

"Every blessing praises God and prays for his gifts." As such,

The use of a sacramental must never slip into the realm of superstition, charms, or magic as though the sacramental itself had some kind of power apart from prayer and devotion.

Sacramentals help us enter more fully into a faith-filled action that calls upon God to bless the situation we are experiencing and to be present in a special way.



ST. MARY'S ASSUMPTION CHURCH NEEDS YOUR HELP!

The estimated cost of a much-needed renovation is \$4 million.



In 1866, Blessed Seelos was appointed Pastor of St. Mary's Assumption Church in New Orleans. His final resting place is located within the church.

Built in 1858-1860, St. Mary's is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is one of the most beautiful Catholic churches in New Orleans. Over the years, age and climate have

taken its toll and the church has sustained serious damage. Plaster has fallen from near the ceiling, indicating issues with water intrusion. Past repairs have been made on a case-by-case basis but if the problem is to be solved, the entire masonry exterior must be addressed in a comprehensive way.

As stewards of this treasure and being deeply devoted to the legacy of Blessed Seelos, the priests and religious of the parish are raising the funds necessary to preserve this beautiful church. Their "Save St. Mary's 2022-2024 Committee" is directing efforts to restore St. Mary's to its original beauty while fortifying its structure for generations of the faithful to come.

SAINTLY CORNER



ST. KATERI TEKAKWITHA

St. Kateri is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint. Born in 1656 in a Mohawk village, she contracted smallpox as a child which killed her entire family and badly scarred her skin. Kateri was raised by her uncle, a Mohawk chief. She was known as a skilled worker, diligent and patient. However, she refused to marry. At age 19, Kateri converted to Catholicism, taking a vow of chastity,

unprecedented for a Native American woman whose future depended on being married. She was always in danger, for her conversion and holy life created great opposition. On the advice of a priest, she stole away one night and began a 200-mile walking journey to a Christian Indian village near Montreal. Kateri was very devout and would put thorns on her sleeping mat. She often fasted and on at least one occasion, she burned herself. Her practices of self-mortification and denial put a strain on her health. Just five years after her conversion, she passed away at age 24, on April 17, 1680. Witnesses said that her emaciated face changed color and became like that of a healthy child. The lines of suffering and smallpox scars disappeared. Kateri is the patroness of ecology and the environment, people in exile, and Native Americans. Her feast day is July 14.

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL

Mount Carmel has been a place of prayer since the 10th century before Christ. In the 12th century, the Order of the Brothers of the Blessed Virgin of Mt. Carmel were officially founded. The 13th century was a time of persecution for the Carmelites. In the midst of this trial, on July 16, 1251 the Blessed Virgin appeared to St. Simon Stock, a Prior of the Carmelites, giving him the Brown

Scapular. She said, "This is a privilege for you and the order: whoever dies wearing the Scapular will be saved." Since that time, the Brown Scapular has become a sign of living for Jesus, following the example of the Blessed Virgin. Along with being the patroness of the Carmelites, Our Lady is also the patron saint for Chile, for Bolivia, for protection from danger, and for deliverance from Purgatory. We celebrate her feast day on July 16.

STS. JOACHIM & ANNE

Saints Joachim (pronounced "wal-keem") and Anne are thought to be the parents of the Virgin Mary. There are no mentions of them in the Bible. What we know comes from Catholic legend and the Gospel of James, an unsanctioned, apocryphal writing from the second century AD. The ancient manuscript says that Mary was promised to Joachim and Anne by an angel, was consecrated to


God, and remained a virgin all her life. Joachim and Anne serve as role models for parents and represent that entire quiet series of generations who faithfully perform their duties and practice their faith, but remain obscure. Their feast day is July 26.
