This admiration becomes all the more intense when I visit the lands from which they came, and see the contrast between America in the 19th century and their home towns at the same time. The culture of the Old World was so much advanced and developed compared to the spurts of the evolving reality of the American lands.

America had not yet had the leisure time needed for the greater refinement of being settled. So, for instance, while the missionaries, with their long habits, walked their missionary journeys they dirtied their hems on muddy roads and boardwalks. The cobble streets of their homelands were a thing of the past, as were so many other details taken for granted.

For Blessed Seelos, the missionary calling meant leaving a quaint and very Catholic home town for the much more austere Redemptorist houses in America, often without the basic conveniences known back home. We know, for example, that Blessed Seelos and St. John Neumann had to share the same room in the rectory of Pittsburgh. Only a curtain between the beds provided a bit of privacy for the two men.

There are so many stories like these. Some of our ancestors did not have the luxury of leaving a settled Europe; they came as an enslaved people who would be sold to the rich and prosperous. Others came to the U.S. because they were starving in their homeland or were suffering terrible oppression. Each story of our immigrant ancestors is worthy of awe. They were valiant, daring and resourceful people. There is plenty to shame us as a nation for the way people were treated at their coming to the United States, but the possibility of a better life loomed in their hearts. They had to take what destiny placed in their path and find ways to benefit as time went along. The European missionaries like Blessed Seelos wanted to make sure that the future of immigrants continued to be nurtured by their faith, and they made great sacrifices to do that. They are heroes to us.

When my daughter was 18 she was diagnosed with Hepatitis B and admitted to the hospital. Her liver was shutting down and her bilirubin level was not reacting to any medicines. I was told that she wasn't getting better and could die. I was beside myself.

My sister-in-law told her grandmother about the situation, asking for prayers. Memaw was a member of the Blessed Father Seelos Society and asked them to go to the hospital to pray over my daughter. When I got to the hospital the

nurses said that my daughter had visitors who came and went very quietly.

When the next vitals were taken my daughter's bilirubin level had increased significantly and her color was good, she was hungry and no longer in danger of dying. The doctor had no explanation, but she was healed and all of her levels returned to normal. This improvement occurred overnight. She is 47 now with 3 grown children of her own. I cannot thank Father Seelos enough for healing my daughter.

Recently, I noticed a pain in my ribcage. I don't recall injuring myself in any way, but it was painful to the touch and to breathe. I couldn't sleep on that side. I didn't go to the doctor, thinking maybe it will go away. I was diagnosed with sleep apnea recently, so the only thing I could figure was somehow that did something to my ribcage. I was trying to lose weight to help lessen my sleep apnea and I became discouraged that with the pain I was having, I couldn't ride my bike for exercise. I could still walk, but not for a long distance. I had this pain for four or five days. I was taking an aspirin here and there, but it was no help.

One morning, I saw a "Miracle Story" episode, *The Life and Miracles Attributed to Father Xavier Seelos*. I had never heard of him. So I prayed to Fr. Seelos to ask God to take away this pain. I was confident in my prayer. I really felt like Fr. Seelos would make the request

to God. The next morning, my ribcage still hurt like usual. I dutifully got ready and began my day at work. After work, I decided to take a walk around the block. It was a pleasant, sunny day. I started to notice something was different. What was it? Oh, I don't have pain in my ribcage! I had forgotten all about it. I felt my ribcage – no pain. I was breathing – no pain. I walked around the block and went a little further – no pain. I never had a healing miracle like this before. I just marveled at it. But then I thought, maybe it's a fluke. So I thanked Fr. Seelos and God for what seemed like a miracle, but wanted to wait til the next day to see if it "stuck". Well, when I woke up the next morning, I noticed I had been sleeping on my ribcage side. The pain was gone, and it has remained gone. I'm just flabbergasted.

I thank God profusely and Fr. Seelos for asking God for that miracle.


"HEAVEN SENT" HOLY BIBLE – \$150

This maroon heirloom bible features antiqued brass and filigree accents, a Miraculous Medal, crystals and pearl beads.




ANTIQUED VIRGIN MARY STATUE – \$58
